Like everyone else, we felt the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. Yet despite challenges, the Confluence Lab has several exciting accomplishments to celebrate. At the end of year one, we had five projects underway. In year two, we have launched two new major grant-funded projects, both related to fire and storytelling. Together, the projects we've embarked on in our first two years have secured \$700,000 of external funding, in addition to internal grant support from the University of Idaho. Most importantly, the Confluence Lab is building bridges across campus and creating closer ties with colleagues and community residents across the state.


Our most recent grant, from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, expands those connections regionally as we partner with the University of Oregon's Center for Environmental Futures and Whitman College to develop a "Pacific Northwest Just Futures Institute for Racial and Climate Justice." We are thrilled about this latest project, which begins right away in 2021 and will bring a diverse team together at the UI under the Lab's umbrella.

COMMUNICATING FIRE: INTEGRATIVE LEARNING THROUGH PARTICIPATORY NARRATIVES

A two-year interdisciplinary project that explores the efficacy of using personal narratives of wildfire to increase participation in informal STEM learning in rural Idaho. Bringing together a science communicator, a narrative theorist, a fire ecologist, and a specialist on emotions and public lands, our interdisciplinary research team focuses on broadening participation in STEM by exploring two main questions: what characteristics of narrative are most effective in fire science communication, and what audience-centered approaches work best when facilitating participant narratives in informal STEM learning?

STORIES OF FIRE: A PACIFIC NORTHWEST CLIMATE JUSTICE ATLAS

A three-year project that is part of the Pacific Northwest Just Futures Institute for Racial and Climate Justice (total grant \$4.52 million). The Institute is a collaboration between the Confluence Lab, the University of Oregon, and Whitman College that works toward racial and climate justice via a regional network. Members of the Confluence Lab will consult with local rural community partners to create a multimodal, polyvocal Atlas that gathers, tracks, and maps stories and images of wildfire, especially those that foreground connections between fire, social/environmental justice, and traditionally underrepresented voices.

STORYING EXTINCTION: RESPONDING TO THE LOSS OF NORTH IDAHO'S MOUNTAIN CARIBOU

Funded primarily via the UI Library's Center for Digital Inquiry and Learning (CDIL) Fellowship program with support from the Confluence Lab, this multi-layered, interdisciplinary digital map explores the 2019 extirpation of the mountain woodland caribou in North Idaho and the community's response to the elimination of the last caribou population in the contiguous United States.
